From the Vicar Living in Love and Faith: The Debate Continues

Late in 2022, the PCC commended the call by a number of bishops for the Church of England to allow clergy (supported by their PCCs) to bless same sex marriages and civil partnerships in church. This call was in response to the *Living in Love and Faith* (LLF) report, which explores questions of marriage, sexuality, gender and identity. Our PCC's views joined those across the CofE who want to see a change in the way the Church has treated LGBTQI+ people through the years.

At February's General Synod this year, the House of Bishops commended a draft set of Prayers of Love and Faith, for use in church for Liturgies of Blessing of

Same Sex Couples, and also pledged to produce a new Pastoral Guidance document for LGBTQI+ lay ministers and clergy, and a set of measures to be put in place for the protection of those who oppose the introduction of same-sex blessings. The Prayers will be finally commended in the July General Synod, but it is clear that the Pastoral Guidance and Measures will not be presented for debate and approval until at least November.

The CofE struggles to hold together as a 'broad me meanwhile if y church' in these matters, as it does, more or less, over the ordination of women, but it may not be possible, in the end. For some congregations and their clergy, it is obvious that same sex couples should be allowed to marry in church: lifelong covenanted relationships of love and faithfulness are to be supported, however they are expressed; and gay and lesbian Christians need to know they are welcomed to church. Other congregations and

clergy find this stance unacceptable, declaring that the sacrament of marriage can only be between a man and a woman, that sexual intimacy apart from marriage is sinful, and to engage deliberately in sin without repentance is to risk divine judgement. Between these two extremes is a range of views, all supported one way or another by a particular reading of scripture and understanding of the Church's history and tradition. Clearly they cannot all be right, and so the question is how the CofE and the Anglican Communion can hold together, and what it will mean if it cannot. As I write, some

churches are considering what they will do if the CofE allows any change, e.g. withdrawing their Common Fund, seeking alternative episcopal oversight, even in some overseas Anglican provinces, questioning the

authority of the Archbishop of Canterbury within the Communion.

We know that there may well be a range of views within our own congregation, and we hope that in the Autumn there will be opportunities to bring people together to express them in a wider discussion, without judgement or prejudice, but with care and love. There will be more about this in the September *Clarion*, but don't hesitate to contact me meanwhile if you would like to have a conversation.



Confirmation, Baptism and Reception at St Mary's on the Feast of St Barnabas

It was a pleasure to welcome The Rt Revd Emma Ineson, Bishop of Kensington to St Mary's in June to confirm, baptise and receive our candidates. Sophia D'Souza joined the service at St Mary Abbots to be confirmed there the week beforehand.

Many congratulations to everyone involved, and thank you to the congregation for supporting them.

Two accounts of their Confirmations

My confirmation was about confirming my baptism. I was baptised last year when I was 9 years old, at St Mary the Boltons. I had to prepare by going to Sunday school, which is funny because our Sunday school is on Wednesdays. Jenny taught us about stories in the Bible and about Jesus' life and also about praying.

I had to prepare this before the confirmation and I was a bit nervous because I had never been in front of so many people. I wasn't alone, though. I had my two best friends with me and also three other adults were getting baptised and confirmed. Also,

my own mother was being received into the Church of England. It was very special that I was with my friends and my mom.

I wore a white dress, which my father bought me and I borrowed beautiful white shoes from a friend who had her first communion a few weeks before. My dad and my nanny (who is also my godmother) were there and also my friends' mom (who is my other grandmother) and their family from Brazil. The church was very full! Bishop Emma was very



kind to us and made us feel more relaxed, and Jenny, whom we know well, was there in the front too, looking after us.

When our turn came to have communion, I went to the front with my mom and friends and the other adults and ate the bread and had a sip of wine for the communion, like Jesus did with his

friends at the last supper.

At the end of the service there was a lot of yummy food, ordered especially for the occasion. I was given a candle; Emma gifted me with an oak cross and Jenny gave me a card and a teenage Bible. It was a beautiful day and we were all very happy. Gabi Lopes Kettle

Having been brought up

in the Catholic faith, I understood well the sacraments and their role in a devout person's life. Like many, once teenage years came along – and with it, a developing, curious and inquisitive mind – it meant I distanced myself from the faith to ask about and experience the secular world.

Fast forward several years (a few decades, in fact!) I find myself slowly circling back to church, physically orbiting closer and closer, firstly, through just living in the same neighbourhood. This was followed by the local neighbourhood school and the many events my daughter and her school friends join each Easter, Harvest Festival, Christmas and other festivities; then, through some charity events; later, via the garden adjacent to church, which became a second home during the pandemic/lockdown months.

Eventually, when looking into getting my daughter baptised and offering her a spiritual education, I found myself with my best friend and her daughters attending Sunday service regularly. It felt strange and awkward at first after so many years of absence and it felt equally incredibly familiar, like a sort of homecoming.

We have always been welcomed by Jenny each Sunday to come and have communion or alternatively, 'come for a blessing anyway' she always says, which we did. And so - always the inquisitive - I enquired with Jenny what would be necessary for me to have communion with the rest It essentially spoke about the importance of having of the congregation, and so, naturally, a conversation on my 'reception' started.



Why, one could ask, once I was already in attendance and very much feeling part of the St Mary The Boltons family, do I not have a straight answer. The most immediate answer is 'it just feels right'. A very important answer to that question is the way we have always been made wonderfully welcome despite our decades' lack of practice, and of course, that we too were doing it for the children, so it made sense we modelled the example ourselves too.



Ultimately, however, a particular sermon in our early months of attending St Mary the Boltons had resonated particularly strongly with me. I could write several pages about it here and why it spoke so directly to me, but the part that has stayed relevant all these months and years is a direct quote:

> When I hear passages like this, I am always encouraged by the words spoken by a friend who said the Gospel of Jesus is always good news, always, even if the words of scripture seem difficult or uncomfortable; our job is to dig away at it until we find it.

hard conversations; about us keeping at it until we find the good news; and that questions should not deter us from seeking all the goodness from the church family and Jesus' teachings. As a psychologist friend said, 'you are not the finished article'. I agree and believe we are work-inprogress until our last day. It has been a true honour to be received into a church that allows me to come in with my conversations, questions, doubts, complexities, and yet which makes me feel accepted and welcomed.

The sermon's last few words encapsulate the spirit of this homecoming:

> The good news then is the fact of God's love, no matter what; the fact of his forgiveness when we fail and the fact of his grace, even when our hearts are hard.

The Silent Prayer meetings continue in church on the second Wednesday of each month, I lam to 12 noon.

A group of people gather to sit together in silence for some 40 minutes. No spoken prayers are said, just the tinkle of a bell at the beginning, end, and half-way through. Being silent for a little while is an invitation to listen to what is happening inside. In our liturgies we are used to address God in praise and song, but listening to the inner 'still small voice' may take some more attention. Doing it with other people forms a creative power that can be felt and can be powerful. Letting go of the need to be busy even for a little time is not only relaxing, but will eventually lead us to the truth of our selves that seems to be the big task of all our lives. There is no need to join anything, book or apologise; just come if and when you can.


