# From the Vicar Dedication Sunday: Giving Thanks for our Church

This year our church turns 173 years old on 22 October, the date of its Consecration in 1850. Our church's history is written elsewhere (see the short book by Arthur Tait, available in the church), and the more recent story is held in memory of, and shared by, a sadly diminishing number of longstanding members of the congregation. It is timely that an update detailing the years since the book was published is being prepared, so that the story is not lost.

Our history gives us much to be thankful for: the parish community in which we are set; the ministry we have been glad to exercise here; the huge numbers of neighbours who have come through our doors to be baptised, or married, or to mark the deaths of loved ones at their funerals; the many people whose attendance at services may be

infrequent, but very regular, as they come along each year to celebrate Christmas and Easter. Our church has provided a place to raise our children in the faith through preparation for baptism and confirmation, and through Sunday school too. We have welcomed local schoolchildren in for school assemblies and RE lessons; and offered food and refreshment to older local people. Our church also offers the particularly precious gift of an open door into a quiet and holy space for anyone and everyone who walks in when nothing is happening at all - most unusual in our part of London, where many churches are locked during the week. And our church gives us a base for community activity and support, through things like the Fair, food collections, 12 Step Groups, and local community meetings. St Mary's Church has been a home for so many people over the decades, and that is why each

October we celebrate the anniversary of our dedication and consecration with a festal Eucharist, giving thanks for our church building and all it stands for, for us and for our local community too.

This issue of *The Clarion* includes a few articles that help illustrate much of what we think is important about St Mary's: there is an article about what is currently happening to the exterior of our building, as we repair and restore the stonework, making it both beautiful and waterproof; there is another about our Fair, with pictures showing just how many people came along to enjoy the day with us;

there is a little advertisement about an event coming up when we will share some of the clippings, photographs and articles about our church, which were found in the loft when we insulated it last year. Do come along if you are interested in seeing pictures of old friends when they were not so old! And of course there is the advertisement for our Dedication Festival, on Sunday 22

October, our 173rd anniversary. At that service we will have special music with a professional octet of singers leading our worship, and it will be followed by special festive refreshments, so do come along if you can.

Dedication festivals are not just about giving thanks and celebrating: they remind us of the constant call to dedicate ourselves to the life of our church, to keeping it open and secure, to making sure the building is in good shape, so that it can continue to offer that home to everyone who comes, and to the ministry of worship and of care, of love towards God and towards our neighbours, too. Will you join us as we do that this autumn? We hope you will.

Wednesday afternoons on Radio 3 feature
Evensong from a myriad of locations around the

been lucky enough to enjoy two such services
because of St Mary's. The first at church for the
Feast of the Blessed Virgin and then eleven days
later Evensong at Southwark Cathedral on what felt
like the wettest day of the year!

The St Mary's service saw a gathering of some of John's amazingly talented friends in the choir loft and with more friends boosting the singing from the pews. The music selection was perfect and it was a treat to be part of the congregation for such a wonderfully restful yet uplifting service with truly spectacular singing. The celebrations after were great fun too and such a treat to meet John's friends and colleagues from his other life away from St Mary's who had travelled from all over the country to join him in this delightful way to celebrate (albeit late) his recent significant birthday.



Southwark Cathedral hosted the choir of Chislehurst and Sidcup Grammar School whose Director of Music is a certain Mr J Ward. I arrived having paddled my way through Borough Market (which for some reason I had totally forgotten was at London Bridge Station) and as usual in my search for the entrance into a Cathedral walked round its entirety before I found the way in. I had also forgotten how utterly charming Southwark

Cathedral is; it is not huge and awe inspiring in a tremendous way, but more domestic in its proportions. The choir was still practising when I arrived and then as the time for the service began they ambled down the side aisle and the organist started to play. People were whispering, the verger was handing out orders of service for those who did not have one with a few additional hastily photocopied ones too, because of the turnout, then there was a stillness and down the aisle they came, led by the Verger. The slightly ragtaggle ambling teens with slightly harassed teachers transformed itself into a dignified, confident, groomed, elegant, respectful with a hint of nerves, procession. The singing was magical. There was no flapping of papers or straggling standing up and sitting down, it was as if they sang Evensong in a cathedral every week. The only thing that let the service down was the singing of the clergy, but that



is probably me being uncharitable, but Jenny was definitely better!

I realise that readers may want to know what was sung on both occasions and being hopeless I cannot remember. Needless to say John will know. I just know it was very lovely and it was a treat to be part of both these services at the end of the day, with their lovely familiar words from the Book of Common Prayer put to glorious music.

I decided to walk over London Bridge to get the District Line home; the rain was torrential and London was very grey apart from the buses but it did not seem to matter and as I looked towards



Tower Bridge, the string of lights came on, which made me smile even more. If you have made a suggestion over the last few weeks or months, be assured that is already on the Charity Committee's list of charities to be considered. We will then make formal recommendations at the next PCC in early November.

It is extremely pleasing to report that the Autumn Fair on Saturday 23 September was very well attended, especially as we were blessed with glorious autumn sunshine after a few days of extremely inclement weather. The newer format of 'embracing' the Church edifices as opposed to using the wider gardens worked extremely well, in particular the detailed maps handed out on arrival significantly aided from a 'traffic management' perspective. The decision on this occasion to outsource the BBQ and introduce the coffee 'tuk tuk' was a notable success. The bookstall's proximity to the 'food court' enhanced the experience, and the ability to sell cash and card and plastic tokens from the table helped. As always, Margarete's cream teas in the hall were a sell out!

We were very pleased that the Mayor of Kensington and Chelsea, wearing their badge of office, attended for a time. We were especially pleased that representatives of our current charities were able to accept our invitation to be with us on the day. Councillor Marie Therese Rossi drew the raffle prizes and publicly thanked St Mary's for our support. Simon Nelson's trio once again provided excellent music during the Fair and we were delighted to welcome the 'Songs and Soup' choir from Holy Trinity Sloane Square for a few songs in the church. As ever, magic performances throughout the afternoon enthralled young children on the lawn.

The Charity Committee thanks everyone who helped in some way, both before the Fair and during the day, and contributed to making it such a success. A special vote of thanks must go to Jane Ellard and Caroline and Calvin Jackson for their tremendous support in project managing the Fair so well. At the time of writing we do not know how much money the Fair raised, but are hopeful

for a record amount, which is tremendous against the backdrop of the challenging economic environment that our chosen charities are operating in.

# Update of the Fabric, October 2023

At its September meeting the PCC was informed of the latest position with the major project works currently in hand.

Firstly there was the news concerning the application to the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) for approval of the plans to alter the layout

at the west end of church by removing the two pews nearest to the Parish Office and to bring the ramp access to church up to the required standard



by raising the level of the external approach from the street to the west door. At the same time we asked for approval to upgrade the thermal insulation of the west end by installing new internal doors, and by insulating the vicar's office and the two rooms at the back of church. The DAC's role is to advise both the Parish and the Diocesan Chancellor who has the final say in granting a faculty for any changes to the inside of the church. A Faculty is the equivalent of planning permission, so it is an important step. DAC

approval was granted, which was good news.

However, as work was also necessary on the outside of church, Local Authority Planning permission was also required. As the formal application to the RBKC Planning Department was being prepared it became apparent that the original



design may not have delivered sufficient improvement to the ramp access to meet the statutory requirements. This has meant that the project, which we had hoped would start this autumn, will not now start until the early part of next year, possibly later in 2024, depending on the nature of the changes that have to be made to the original plan.

The work at the west end of church started at the beginning of September. This is required both to remedy the damp in the gallery stair well and to maintain the condition of the external stonework on the area that is now covered by scaffolding. This too hit problems. As the work to remove the loose and rough parts on the lime stone proceeded, so called defrassing, it became apparent that 13 stones needed to be replaced. (see photo on the right).

This has added nearly £2,000 to the cost. There will also be a delay of several weeks while the new stones are procured and dressed. The external walls of the church are faced with Kentish Ragstone. While this stone was once widely quarried in Kent, there is apparently now only one supplier, and so our order simply takes its place in the queue. During the heavy rain and wind during the night following the PCC meeting, a significant leak occurred in the area where the masons had been working, but they returned early on the Saturday morning to make a temporary repair.



Finally inside church our lighting contractors have worked out why some of the LED lights on the corbels have stopped working. (The corbels are those projections around the church at the level of the top of the windows which appear to support the roof beams). Apparently there is a fault with a LED Driver and we are now waiting for a new one to arrive from the original supplier, we anticipate under warranty. LED lights need a very constant and precise amount of power. The driver is the part of the system that ensures that the supply from the grid is regulated to meet these specific requirements.

While these delays are frustrating, in the background each of the contractors and our professional advisers have been responsive and helpful. Thank you to Hanslip and Company Ltd, CES Lighting, and Stone Edge Conservation Ltd.



# A New 'Library of Things'

From October 2023 a Library of Things will be coming to Kensington, based at Kensington Leisure Centre, Silchester Road.

Library of Things is a social enterprise that helps people save money and reduce waste by affordably



renting out useful items like drills, sound systems and sewing machines from local spaces, and by helping neighbours share practical skills. It works by requesting an item via an app, paying a small borrowing fee, then collecting your item with a unique code from a locker at the leisure centre. Anyone can use it, but Borough residents can get a 25 per cent discount on borrowing items.

# By Train around Spain


Flying from a packed Gatwick airport after the much publicised Air Traffic Control meltdown on the previous weekend was an experience. However, with only a fifteen minute delay I arrived in Bilbao, staying close to the Guggenheim Museum on the

riverside walk in Bilbao's old town. The following morning, I travelled to Durango, using the Basque rail network (Euskotren) to spend a few days with my brother Peter, his wife Nerea and my niece Elana.



My first long train journey: Bilbao to Segovia. Spain's long-distance trains are smart, clean, and fast, so a thoroughly pleasant journey. I arrived in Segovia just in time for sunset, a bus dropping me by the awesome Roman aqueduct. The following morning, a visit to the Alcazar (Castle of Segovia) and the





Cathedral, both close to where I was staying. The cathedral was amazing, and quiet. The Alcazar had an amazing collection of arms and armour.

Segovia to

Salamanca was only a short journey (129km). I arrived at the same time as a major festival was taking place, and managed to get a free ticket to a concert by Vanesa Martín Mira (a star in Spain and Latin America). How come the free ticket, you may ask; the concert began at 11pm approx. 50 feet away from the hotel I was staying.

Salamanca to Cordoba, via Madrid (315km). My train left at 6.15am, and travelling across Spain I was

able to see some amazing scenery. My hotel in Cordoba, being a little way from the train station, needed a bit of searching for, and was within walking distance of the historic Jewish quarter with amazing atmospheric small streets. Saturday morning I found the Botanical Gardens, and had them almost to myself. Lastly, a visit to Cordoba Zoo in the afternoon.

Cordoba to Valencia via Madrid (421km). It took most of Sunday for the journey to Valencia, where I was staying right by the central market. The following morning I got a bus to the city of arts and science in

Valencia, amazing modern buildings and a visit in the morning to the Oceanographic – the biggest aquarium in Europe – then the BioPark Zoo.

Valencia to Barcelona (303km). Here I stayed in the Gothic quarter within walking distance of Barceloneta with its reasonable-priced restaurants, enjoying awesome seafood. Then I caught a local train to Vilanovia la Geltra, to visit the Catalonian Railway Museum, seeing lots of stream trains. Because I arrived early, I had the whole site to very peaceful myself. In the afternoon I managed a paddle in the med before catching the train back to Barcelona (this time a double decker).

> All in all a fantastic time; the trains were brilliant, and the staff very helpful. I enjoyed delicious food and seeing some amazing places. One small tip is to always check how near the railway station is to the town: Segovia was unexpectedly far away from the town centre.



There is no need to join anything, book or apologise; just come if and when you can.
