From the Vicar The Archdeacon's Triennial Visitation

Now that's an example of church-speak if ever there was one. Let me explain.

Every three years St Mary's (and every parish in the Church of England) undergoes a kind of inspection by our Archdeacon, one of the senior staff in the Diocese. It is a formal inspection of our church's organisation, looking at a range of aspects: from how we manage our finances, to how we perform and order our worship; from our policies for safeguarding and health and safety, to our policies for employing and managing our lay staff and volunteers; from matters to do with maintenance, repair and improvements to our building, to the contracts and agreements with our tenants and people who occasionally hire the premises. If you think all this sounds like bloodless bureaucracy, just remember that one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit is that of administration; and the first act of the Spirit of God in creation was to bring order out of chaos, so this is an exercise that is not only necessary, but theological.

Yet there is more to the Visitation than just good administration. It also provides an opportunity for the Vicar and Churchwardens to have a conversation about what the church is really for, its mission and work and ministry in the parish. After asking about the nuts and bolts of the church's life, the final question the Archdeacon asks is, 'Is there anything else that the Churchwardens or the PCC would like to raise?' He hopes that this will encourage discussion about what is most important to the life of the church. It may well be to do with good administration or finance, but hopefully coupled with a concern for growing and nurturing the congregation, for learning how better to proclaim the Good News in the local area, for

making the church more welcoming or more available, or more open to anyone who might come through our doors. It is hoped that the conversation will continue with the PCC and the rest of the congregation, to encourage them to be more involved, or more engaged, to be more faithful in their Christian life. I hope that our Churchwardens and I will have a lot to raise with the Archdeacon when he comes. What would you want them to raise?

In our part of the diocese, our Archdeacon normally delegates the Visitations to the Area Deans; in the Chelsea Deanery, that is me. I have the privilege of asking about the administration and good order of the churches in our little area, and asking the question, 'What else do you want to raise?' After Covid (when the Visitations were

suspended), there are a good number of churches to catch up with, and a lot of good conversations to be had in the coming months. Thank goodness, our Archdeacon The Ven Richard Frank will be helping us here at St Mary's to think about our ministry in our parish. Please will you continue to pray for our church, as we take that conversation forward. *Jenny Welsh*

The Story of the Tikondane Nthawisa Farmers Group

We received this story as a USPG Partner in Mission in Malawi, which is one of our principal charities.



At the inception of the community programme, the community volunteers and local leaders from Nthawisa village identified vulnerable families that needed support.

They organised a group called Tikondane, where 22 members (4 men and 18 women) have been actively participating in the programme-related activities. The group received training on how to make compost using locally available resources. They were also trained on how to manage small-scale businesses, trained in Village Savings and Loan (VSL) activities, and were encouraged to establish small businesses to increase their incomes.

The group members started contributing shares for their village bank. They trained in environmental management as this catchment area is suffering the effects of climate change year on year. The group planted 500 trees in a community forest where they achieved a 50% survival rate as unfortunately it was too hot for some of the trees to flourish. They also received training on how to make briquettes and environmentally friendly stoves.



There has been a significant change in the lives of the beneficiaries who have received an increase in income. Group members contributed shares and shared the dividends among the active members. The group has been selling the vegetables, and members harvest the produce for their own household daily so that they don't buy from the

market. Eating fresh vegetables from their garden has been really fulfilling for the group. The proceeds from the sales are shared on a daily basis once sold, so that everyone benefits equally, and some are investing the money in small-scale businesses.

Covid and Communion: further thoughts

In February I wrote about the PCC's conversations about how we take communion together. We were not ready to start offering communion 'in both kinds' yet, but we recognised that our communion felt incomplete, even though perfectly valid. I am writing now to let you know how the conversation has developed, because not only has the sense of risk of Covid changed, so has our thinking about how we respond. It is timely that the Church of England guidance has now changed and that churches should consider giving communion in both kinds, except where there is clear reason not to. At the May PCC meeting someone asked, 'Why can we not use those little individual cups? They use them in the Methodist Church, and indeed in the Church of Ireland'. It seems like a perfect solution, except that the problem is, the Church of England has explicitly not permitted it. The reason, say the Bishops, is that the cup needs to be shared. This is a strong sign of our sharing together in the Sacrament: we do not take it alone.



When we share it, we are reminded of our unity and willingness to accept each other and we share our lives as we share the cup. Little cups are not the answer.

What are the options now? In some parishes you will find that the chalice is offered as before. People are given the option of receiving, and those who abstain are free to do so. Indeed, this has always been the case and some people have always received only the bread. In discussion there was still much uneasiness about this option at St Mary's, but some of us would welcome it.

In other parishes, the presiding minister dips the bread in the chalice, and places it in the hand of those receiving. Intinction (or presidential intinction), as it is called, was seen as a viable option for us, at least for the members of our PCC. It enables both elements to be received, makes use of the common chalice, and because only the minister dips the bread and does not touch the person's hand, it is a Covid-safe process. It is certainly far safer than individual intinction, even with sanitised hands.

The PCC is keen to make the option of communion in both kinds possible once again. With that in mind, we will begin using the second option or 'simultaneous administration' from the second Sunday in June. The chalice will be held by a communion assistant, while the priest administers the bread dipped in wine. If anyone wishes to receive undipped bread all they need to do is indicate that when they come to the altar rail. This will be a bit of an experiment for us to see how it works. I hope that members of the congregation

will be patient with one another as we get used to this new step. I will be pleased, once we have begun, to hear what you think.

Until then, the Eucharist will continue as it has been during the pandemic. Let us be thankful for the grace and nourishment we receive through the sacrament and through our prayer and fellowship together.
