From the Vicar

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, 2 March. Last year, we joked that 2020 had been one extended Lenten season, as we denied ourselves the pleasures of companionship, entertainment, as well as opportunities to mourn together, to visit loved ones and to worship with abandon. Never had the idea that the Lenten fast is not all about giving up alcohol or chocolate seemed so true! It is not what we give up for our own sakes that matters, but what we let go for the sake of others: so we stayed apart, faces covered, doing our best to keep the rules because we believed (and continue to, for the most part) it was for the sake of our neighbours: loving them as ourselves.

This year we are in a new place, thank Heaven, what with vaccinations and milder variants, and a sense of 'endemic rather than pandemic', and we are tired of thinking about Covid.

It is good to remember that Lent is actually about exercising virtues of penitence, self-examination and self-denial, and so I hope that you will think about how you will keep the season and how you might share Lent with us at St Mary's.

I flagged our programme in the February issue of the *Clarion*, and elsewhere in this issue you will find it laid out in detail. I hope that the Study Group's looking at the book *Embracing Justice* will help us to talk about what it means to believe in the justice of God, as revealed in scripture, and what it means for us to seek and work for justice in our day and in our small corner of the world. I hope that by adding weekly night prayers to our regular round of prayer and worship we will be inspired to be more faithful in prayer, more aware of our need to pray with the whole church. I hope that Lent may inspire us to take on a Lenten fast: to give up and let go of the things that bring us comfort, pleasure and so

on, but which turn us from looking for and receiving the comfort and joy and strength of God.

In 2017, Pope Francis offered advice for people who want to keep a good Lent, and particularly to embrace the idea of a good Fast. He said:

Fast from hurting words and say only kind words. Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude. Fast from anger and be filled with patience. Fast from pessimism and be filled with hope. Fast from worries and have trust in God. Fast from complaints and contemplate simplicity. Fast from pressures and be prayerful. Fast from bitterness and fill your hearts with joy. Fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others.

Fast from grudges and be reconciled.

Fast from words and be silent so you can listen.

Why do we have a Lent Appeal?

In the February Clarion, the Vicar wrote that part of our Lenten discipline ought to include 'the giving of alms'. It is this element of Lent that inspired the Charity Committee to launch its first Lent Appeal. It March, and it would be great to muster a group to has since become an important part of St. Mary's year and a valuable contributor to our Charitable Pot. This was especially true when the pandemic disrupted so much of our lives. The Common Worship Liturgy for Ash Wednesday includes an invitation for us to observe a holy Lent by fasting and self-denial. A very simple way of doing this is to give up some food or drink that we enjoy, such as chocolate or a daily take-away coffee, during Lent. The money saved can then become your Lent Offering: your 'giving of alms'.

Marking Lent in this way is common to many churches and is financially painless, but it is only one way. There are others. Perhaps you will give up some activity, or some of your free time to help others. Or decide to make a financial sacrifice or simply make your offering. All that the Charity Committee hopes is that you will want to respond to our appeal to make a financial Lent Offering this year. Everyone attending church is being offered a Lent Appeal card. Please take one as a reminder of your commitment. All the charities for which we are raising money this year, including our five main charities, are shown on the front of the card. On the reverse are the four ways in which you can make your offering. Just choose the one that is most convenient for you. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on 2 March and continues until Saturday 16 April. We ask you to make your offering by the end of April if you can. Of course you can make your offering before then if you want to!



World Day of Prayer 2022

One of the last things we did at St Mary's before the pandemic was to host the 2020 World

Day of Prayer service. It was a joy to welcome more than 40 local Christians from many different churches to celebrate and pray, using a liturgy prepared by women in Zimbabwe. This year's World Day of Prayer service has been prepared by women in England, Wales and Northern Ireland, and will celebrate our diversity and the contribution made to our countries by the many groups and individuals who have made their home here. Using the words from Jeremiah, 'I know the plans I have for you', the service will reflect on some of the issues facing our societies today: poverty, domestic abuse and disability, finding hope and encouragement in difficult situations.

World Day of Prayer services will take place all around the world, beginning in Samoa and moving on through New Zealand and Australia, across Asia, Africa, Europe and finally the United States and South America before finishing in American Samoa. In our own nation, services will take place in villages and towns across the land, too. Our local service this year is at Methodist Central Hall in Westminster.

Bishop Sarah Mullally, the Bishop of London will be present, along with the President of the Methodist Conference and the Chair of the World Day of Prayer UK. A church school choir will be singing.

A good-news story

Some readers may have heard me before now talking about the Human Rights and Nursing Awards that are given yearly to two nurses whose 'contributions and accomplishments [of nominees] must be of international significance to human rights. The contributions of the nominee have influenced health care and/or nursing practice'. I was deeply involved with the Awards for nearly 20 years.

One of the very first recipients in 2001 was Karla Schefter from Germany, who had established and ran a hospital in Afghanistan, in Chak-e-Wardak, some 60km north of Kabul. Karla has stayed in touch with me through newsletters and the occasional telephone call. The hospital is supported by a charity from Germany, which means that anyone presenting at the hospital gets the necessary care entirely free. They treat over 4000 people a month, some 44% women, 27% children, and 29% men. Nobody is refused access or care.

Karla phoned me recently to tell me that everything is working as normal. For all the years that the has hospital existed, the Taliban never interfered with the running of the hospital, and especially now, they ensure that all is going well. They have 15 women employees (doctors, nurses, radiographers) and they continue working. The hospital runs a school for children who are ill or depending on sick mothers who are in-patients. The main problem they have is limited access to a bank and they can only take out enough money to pay salaries and essentials, but they manage.

Among all the dire news stories from Afghanistan, it is wonderful to hear this kind of news. Karla is convinced that this is only possible because the charity behind the enterprise is completely free of any political or religious organisations and has always been run in a very open and trustworthy way by a committee in Dortmund, Germany.



Silent Prayer in Church

The Silent Prayer meetings continue in church on the second Wednesday of each month, I lam to 12 noon.

A group of people who gather sit together in silence for some 40 minutes. No spoken prayers are said, just the tinkle of a bell at the beginning and end and half-way through. Being silent for a little while is an invitation to listen to what is happening inside. In our liturgies we are used to address God in praise and song, but listening to the inner 'still small voice' may take some more attention. Doing it with other people forms a creative power that can be felt and can be powerful. Letting go of the need to be busy even for a little time is not only relaxing, but will eventually lead us to the truth of our selves that seems to be the big task of all our lives. There is no need to join anything, book or apologise; just come if and when you can.



Electoral Roll

The Church Electoral Roll will be open for revision from Sunday 6 March in advance of the APCM on Sunday 24 April. Please check your entry on the current roll to ensure your details are still correct. If there are any minor errors please contact the Electoral Roll Officer, Fiona Parsons, er@stmarytheboltons.org.uk. If there is a major change (i.e. name, address etc.), a new form will need to be completed. The roll can be viewed at the back of the church on Sundays or in the Parish Office during the week. If you are unable to come to the church, then please either email Fiona on the above email address or ring the Parish Office to check your entry.

If you are not on the roll, but would like to join, the criteria are that a person must be over 16 years of age and baptised. They should also either live in the parish or have worshipped at the church regularly for at least six months, and should be a member of the Church of England or a church in communion with it, or a member of good standing of a Church not in communion with the Church of England which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity where those members are also prepared to declare themselves to be members of the Church of England. (Blue) Application forms are available at the back of the church. Once completed please place them in the specially marked 'Electoral Roll' box. Completed application forms must be received by Sunday 27 March. If you have not completed a form by that date, you will need to wait until after the APCM on 24 April to join.
