From the Vicar If you open the doors, people will come in

We are glad at St Mary's to be able to keep our church open most days, most of the time. I had not realised how unusual this practice is, as many of the churches around London are only open when there are services or other events going on. This is partly for reasons of security, where there is anxiety about things being damaged or stolen, or when there is no-one to supervise the building. It is also, I suspect, partly because of a sense that the building is just a building, and less of a holy space where God can be encountered even when worship is not taking place.

Here at St Mary's we are firmly of the opinion that our church is indeed a place of encounter with God. Our church is a big visual aid, full of things like candles, images, and 'furniture' (font, altar, even pews) that speak of what our faith is about. Most days, several people will come into the church, to sit or kneel down to say their prayers; light candles for the situations that concern them; look around at the beautiful images; and very occasionally stop into the office to chat or to ask questions. They also get a sense of what our own concerns are as Christians: they find us offering hospitality each Friday at the Second Half Club; they see our Food Collection Boxes; they read our posters about resources for vulnerable people, respond to our invitation to write prayers for the situations that trouble them. They discover musicians rehearsing, local school children doing RE classes, and florists making their arrangements for weddings and funerals. When doors are open, people come in.

We know that sometimes people come to church knowing very little about the Gospel, or what goes

on in church. They may have never learned the Christian story, or come from a different tradition entirely. We know that it can be scary to step over the threshold for the first time, but that some people are just intrigued by historic churches and interested in exploring the meaning behind them. These are all good reasons why we do our utmost to make St Mary's a place of welcome, acceptance, and of invitation to discover more.

Stewardship Update

Last month I flagged up the prospective Stewardship Campaign, explaining that we would be inviting parishioners to look again at our giving to St Mary's, and particularly how we support the parish financially.

As was described in the Fabric Report at the APCM, we need to raise substantial funds to pay for extensive repair and refurbishment work planned for our church building, and to further our Net Zero Carbon Action Plan. While some of that work will take place this summer, much of will take time, requiring permissions from the Diocese, consultation with our architect and seeking quotes.

With that in mind, we have decided to postpone the Stewardship Campaign until the autumn, when we can provide a fuller indication of the costs of these works, so that parishioners can know how their donations will be spent. It is not just about our building, but also our running costs for fuel, lighting, staffing and so on. Most importantly, it is about how we sustain the ministry and work of St Mary's as we work towards the parish vision, to help all parishioners to encounter the love of God in Christ.

Our building is not just a lovely building. It is a holy space; a gathering place for much of what we do as a church; a welcoming place for visitors, babies being baptised, couples being married; families mourning their loved ones; a community space for local groups and institutions with whom we work in our neighbourhood. Paying for all of that is not just about paying the bills, but furthering the mission of God's church here in the parish.

Postponing the campaign does not mean that looking at our giving needs to wait. If you have not thought about your offerings to St Mary's, and you want to know how to give regularly, or you are keen to know how our money is spent, do speak with me or our Treasurer, Carolyn Stubbs, or have a look at the accounts that were received at the APCM at the end of April. They are on display in the porch and copies are available in church. *Jenny Welsh*, Vicar

How I miss singing and worshipping with you all in London!

I am instead here in Warsaw, helping on the ground as we move Ukrainian musicians and their families out of Ukraine to safe havens elsewhere. Yesterday I picked up a lady from Kyiv, who is going to Berlin. Later today a family of three will arrive from Dnipro (after a 36+ hour journey) and hopefully will have the correct paperwork for me to be able to put them safely onto a plane to Norway tomorrow after hosting them for one night. It's been pretty full on, and I think will continue to be here for some time, so I've set up a small initiative called www.helpmusiciansukraine.com where we are fundraising to support the emergency activities here through a justgiving page: https:// www.justgiving.com/crowdfunding/help-musiciansukraine). Our aims are to find musicians and musiclovers who are in a position to host Ukrainian musicians in Europe, and further afield (https:// byom.host), and highlighting emergency residencies and job opportunities for Ukrainian musicians. The Silent Prayer meetings continue in church on the second Wednesday of each month, I lam to 12 noon.

A group of people who gather sit together in silence for some 40 minutes. No spoken prayers are said, just the tinkle of a bell at the beginning and end and half-way through. Being silent for a little while is an invitation to listen to what is happening inside. In our liturgies we are used to address God in praise and song, but listening to the inner 'still small voice' may take some more attention. Doing it with other people forms a creative power that can be felt and can be powerful. Letting go of the need to be busy even for a little time is not only relaxing, but will eventually lead us to the truth of our selves that seems to be the big task of all our lives. There is no need to join anything, book or apologise; just come if and when you can.
